LEAD SAFE HOMES BILL (HF1007/SF1798)

LEAD POISONING IS IRREVERSABLE

- In Minnesota, there are 359,000 renter occupied units which have potential lead hazards.
- Lead testing is not universal across the state.
- Lead poisoning disproportionately impacts our diverse communities.
- Additional services including special education, disability services and Medicaid are often needed for the lifetime of a child who is poisoned by lead.

This bill allocates \$1 million/ year to ensure more lead safe homes in urban and rural areas.
